SPORTS PHYSICALS

Kindergarten Registration:

Kindergarten registration for the 2018-2019 school year will be held at the school on Friday, April 6th from 1:30 - 2:30 P.M. During registration, the incoming kindergarten students are invited to visit the current kindergarten classroom.

While their children are in class, parents will go to the library to preregister the students for the fall session. At this time, registration and enrollment forms need to be completed. Information needed to complete these cards include: names and telephone numbers of the child's doctor and dentist, phone numbers where the child's parents can be reached during the day and a relative or neighbor whom the school should contact if unable to reach the parents.

To be eligible to attend kindergarten during the 2018-2019 school year, a child must be five years old on or before September 1, 2018. <u>A</u> certified copy of the child's birth certificate must be presented at the time of registration.

Parents will also receive physical and dental examination forms. Kindergarten students <u>will not be allowed to begin school in August</u> unless these forms have been completed and returned to the school.

School fees will be paid during the regular school registration days on either August 6th or 9th. Pre-registration of new kindergarten students allows the school to organize the kindergarten class and transportation schedule.

Sports Physicals:

Newark Healthcare Center is graciously doing sports physicals again for Lisbon Grade School on Monday, April 23, 2018 at 1 PM. The fee for these physicals will be \$20 cash or check made payable to **Morris Hospital**. They are also offering an incentive and plan to "give back" to the school by offering the fees back to go towards the end of year character counts assembly. So if your student needs a sports physical for next year, this is a great way to free up an appointment for you plus help the school. All students participating in a school sport <u>must have a sports physical</u> before they participate with the exception of 6th grade that must have a complete school physical prior to participating.

Morning Drop off:

If you drop off your child in the morning <u>after 8:20 AM</u>, please come into the office and sign him/her in. It is very important that the teacher and the office have consistent information so that our records are accurate.

Absences:

If you know your child is going to be absent, please call the school office and leave a message on the recorder the night before or call the school by 9:00 AM the morning of the absence.

Hot Lunches:

If your child orders a hot lunch in the morning and then realizes later that they have a cold lunch, they will still be charged for a hot lunch. Unfortunately, once the food is prepared, it must be eaten or thrown away.

Recycle:

We want to encourage community members and parents to bring their old newspapers for the paper recycle bin and any clothing articles for the UsAgain clothing bin both on the south side of the building. These are both great ways to teach our students how to recycle and be environmentally smart.

Bus Notes:

The school requires that parents always write a note to the office or teacher if a student is to go home from school by a different method than normal. Often time's children get mixed up on dates or where they are to go if a note is not sent. Our policy is to have students follow the normal routine unless they have a note or the school receives a phone call from the parents.

Medication:

All students who require medication at school (over-the-counter or prescription drugs) must have a physicians' signed approval and also a parent's signed consent. These forms are in your Lisbon Grade School Parent/Student Handbook or may be obtained in the school office. In addition, parents are responsible for labeling all non-prescription drugs with the student's name, doctor's name and dosage. The medication should be kept in the nurse's office during school hours.

Graduation:

8th Grade Graduation will be held on Wednesday, May 23rd at 7:00 P.M. Individual student pictures will be taken at 6:00 P.M. <u>All</u> 8th grade students must be here at 6:00 P.M.

Kindergarten Graduation:

Kindergarten Graduation will be held on Thursday, May 24th at 10:00 A.M.in the gym with the traditional kindergarten picnic to follow. The LGS spring music concert will be <u>Thursday, May 17th</u>. The concert begins promptly at 6:30 P.M. and students need to meet in their classrooms at 6:10 P.M. The concert performance is a music grade. If your child is unable to attend, a written note must be given to the office or their classroom teacher. We look forward to seeing you at the concert for some great music!



Spring News from Second Grade


We are ready to welcome spring in second grade! We are tired of gray dreary days. Sunshine, warmer weather, and being outside are some of the things we are looking forward to. We have been looking for signs of spring. We were pretty excited to start seeing robins. Please check the weather in the morning before school so you know whether you need to send your child in a coat. Weather can be so unpredictable, and we usually are outside for recess.

I am trying to introduce the students to different types of writing. Usually we find one type of book that appeals to us, and we don't venture out of that area. I'm excited to see that some of the second graders are reading biographies. As I helped the students find their books for their cereal box book reports, I tried to find them a book that challenged them or was different than what they usually read. The book reports turned out great! Thank you for your help with this project!

This quarter we will begin to learn the cursive capital letters. It is a very exciting time for second graders. Please remind your child to practice the cursive letters that we have learned at home. Joining the letters to form words is especially difficult. The idea that you can't lift up your pencil when writing a word is challenging some of the students. In spelling we are learning to write the words in print and cursive. On the tests, though, I will only grade the printed words.

We will spend the month of April learning about eggs, chickens, incubation, and embryology. Our eggs should arrive in the mail the first week of April. The class has been looking forward to it all year! It is a favorite unit of mine as well. Pretty soon everyone in the class will be "eggsperts"!

Keep encouraging your child to read in his/her spare time. As the weather warms up it is hard to keep everyone reading! I do ask students to read at least two regular books or one chapter book a week and take the accompanying test(s). Be on the lookout for information regarding the

Next, they will learn about letter writing, verbals, and verbal phrases. After break, the eighth graders will be starting literature circles with a variety of recent novels. Math classes are busy preparing for the PARCC test. Each day, we will be working on a combination of problem solving and review. After we conquer the PARCC exam, sixth grade will work on getting acquainted with using integers while seventh grade becomes more fluent solving algebraic equations. Eighth grade will have an added bonus of mastering quadratic equations. Remember that all LGS students can practice math on IXL.com wherever there is an internet connection. Take advantage of this great tool to help reinforce concepts learned in class.

Seventh grade science class has finished presenting their 3rd quarter projects. In the 4th quarter, we will focus on the systems of the human body, which includes the popular cow eyeball dissection. Eighth grade science class will be starting their final project on a "Forces and Energy" topic of their choice. All of the projects require using different applications, including Word, Excel, and Power Point software. Everyone will be using the classroom laptops to complete the projects.
