# Surrintendent Comments

#### Important Noces to our ratenes.

If you drop off your child in the morning after 8:20 A.M, please come into the office and sign him/her in. It is very important that the teacher and the office have consistent information so that our records are accurate.

All students who require medication at school (over-the-counter or prescription drugs) must have a physicians' signed approval and also a parent's signed consent. These forms are in your Lisbon Grade School Parent/Student Handbook or may be obtained in the school office. In addition, parents are responsible for labeling all non-prescription drugs with the student's name, doctor's name and dosage. The medication should be kept in the nurse's office during school hours.

During the annual fire and safety drills, some students noted that they did not have working smoke detectors in their homes. The local fire department wanted to inform parents that they can provide smoke detectors free of charge to those families that do not have them. Please contact the fire department if you are interested in this service.

#### Illinois Assessment Dates:

The state wide assessment test will be given  $April\ 18^{th} - 29^{th}$ . We ask parents to make sure that students have an adequate amount of rest and eat a good breakfast during testing week. Also, please avoid making appointments during this time, as students have to make up the test(s) missed at a later date.

#### Recycle:

We want to encourage community members and parents to bring their old newspapers or clothing





items and deposit them in the correct recycle bin on the south side of the building. Any money earned is used for our end of year character counts assembly.

#### Kindergarten Registration:

Registration will be Friday, April 15<sup>th</sup>, 1:30 P.M. in the library.



#### D.A.R.E.:

The Kendall County Sheriff's Department is providing an officer on a periodic basis to serve our school. He will be in the school building during the day to talk with students and to get to know our students, staff and community better. Our students have really enjoyed this interaction in the past and it is a great avenue for students to get to know our law enforcement officials.

#### Absences:

If you know your child is going to be absent, please call the school office and leave a message on the absente phone option the night before or call the school by 9 A. M. the morning of the absence.

#### Hot Lunches:

If your child orders a hot lunch in the morning and then realizes later that they have a cold lunch, or an appointment they were aware of, they will still be charged for a hot lunch.

Unfortunately, once the food is prepared, it must be eaten or thrown away. Along those lines, just a reminder that students are not to share food during lunch for safety/sanitary reasons.

# Lisbon CCSD #90 State Budget Crisis

Schools across the state are being asked to do more with less each year. The Governor and state legislators are placing more mandates on schools each year, yet district funding has been cut dramatically over the past several years.

Since 2008, our school district has seen a decline in state aid by over <u>50%!</u> This does not include lost revenue in terms of state and federal grants and areas such as transportation. The lost revenue noted here has resulted in cuts to technology, foreign language, staff and other areas.

According to the most recent Whinois District Report Card 2015+, Lisbon CCSD #90 spends \$2,732.00 <u>less</u> per student in Wastructional expenditures+(direct costs of teaching students) than the state average.

In addition, our district spends \$3,667.00 <u>less</u> per student in total perating expenditures+(gross operating cost of a school district) than the state average. These numbers certainly indicate that Lisbon CCSD #90 <u>does more while spending significantly less.</u>

This is a direction that neither our school, nor others in the state, can continue without real harm to our students and teachers. When comparing tax levies, Lisbon CCSD #90 has a levy of \$3.00 which is significantly lower than the state average of \$5.16.

When you have the opportunity, please express your concerns to our local representative or senator about this dramatic loss of resources. Students and staff in Lisbon CCSD #90 deserve better than this!

# Congratulations to Students and Staff!!!!!

According to %SchoolDigger.com+, Lisbon CCSD#90 is the second ranked school district in the state of Illinois in testing results for the 2014-2015 school year. Out of 783 school districts in the state which had reported results, our school ranks second when Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Career (PARCC) scores are compared.

PARCC is the statewide assessment that occurs each spring for grades 3-8 in the areas of math and reading. The testing includes all students in these grade levels. The results of these tests are used each year to improve or upgrade our school curriculum.

The PARCC tests are taken online and are more extensive than statewide tests given in the past. The new tests require that written justification be given for most of the answers. In the past, most answers were true/false, multiple choice, etc. A more in-depth look at the scores can be obtained by visiting the School Digger web site (www.schooldigger.com) or by visiting Illinois Report Card at <a href="http://iirc.niu.edu">http://iirc.niu.edu</a>. This site reports results for all the school districts in the state.

These scores are a testament to the effort that our teachers and students make each and every day at school. Our staff has very high expectations of our students, and they in turn have responded with outstanding test scores.

Individual student results have been sent home to parents which included explanations of the test and how to interpret the results.

Parents who seek more information on this topic can look at research/data posted on the Illinois State Board of Education web site.

PARCC assessments will be given this spring from April 18-29<sup>th</sup>. We look forward to continued success.

# Sixth Grade News

January has been a busy month in 6th grade! In Reading, we just completed the novel, Number the Stars, by Lois Lowry. We had a lot of interesting discussions during this study and the students really enjoyed it! We have started working on some PARRC assessment practice passages in preparation for the tests that will be administered at the end of April. We will also work on a variety of writing prompts to help each student do his/her best during the week of assessments. In Geography, we have learned about Europe and the differences between Eastern and Western European countries. have been able to connect events in Number the Stars with historical events in Europe during the same World War II time period. In Science, we learned about soil erosion and conservation methods. We will also be discussing weathering and mass movement from winds and waves. I am very proud of our 6th graders and encourage all of them to continue to complete daily assignments and always do their best!

In 7<sup>th</sup> grade Social Studies, we discussed the framework of the Constitution and how some of the goals of the founding fathers were achieved. We also learned about the qualifications for becoming an American citizen. The students even took a sample citizenship test to get an idea of the written requirements. It was kind of interesting! We have discussed the beginning of political parties, as well as Hamilton and Jefferson ideas. In our next chapter, we will be learning about American expeditions with Lewis and Clark. We have also been keeping informed about daily news events through our CNN Student News reports. The students are learning to be informed about what's going on

around them. Keep up the good work, 7 th grade!



In 8<sup>th</sup> grade Social Studies, we will be completing our study of the Great Depression and the events leading up to World War II. We will be learning about short term and long term events in the war as well as significant discussions regarding the effects of Pearl Harbor, the atomic bomb and the Holocaust. In the next couple of weeks, we will be starting our unit on the Constitution. Each student will receive a Constitution workbook and they will be responsible for completing daily assignments in it. # Seventh Grade News

January has been a busy and productive month so far. In addition to our regular lessons, students have started preparing for PARCC testing. Scholastic Bowl also started this month, and the members are all looking forward to their first match in February.

The sixth graders just finished up their unit on using dialogue. After learning how to use quotation marks and commas correctly, the students applied what they learned while writing several

narrative stories using quotes. They had some very interesting stories to share!

Seventh grade just finished up their compare and contrast essays featuring two people of their choice that they researched during lab time. They will be moving on to a unit on dialogue next. In Reading, seventh grade finished their unit on stories that follow the theme "Living in the Heart." This unit featured many poems, and students have been getting better at using the "Close Read" technique which involves re-reading a text several times and analyzing different aspects of the text. We have now started analyzing a speech by Cesar Chavez.

Eighth grade did an amazing job analyzing speeches by Harriet Tubman, Shirley Chisholm, and Venus Williams. We learned about different RESEARCH rhetorical strategies that speakers use to make their arguments stronger. They will be starting their unit on Anne Frank next. We are reading a play based on The Diary of Anne Frank and will be discussing the dangers of prejudice, how one person can make a difference, and the impact that literature can have on the world. At the end of the unit, they will be completing a World War II research paper that will count as an English and a Social Studies grade. Students will also have an opportunity to complete an extra credit assignment that involves reading a historical fiction book from the WWII time period, completing an activity, and presenting their information to the class.

Congratulations to all the students who already have their first AR book read for the semester! The deadline for the first book is February  $5^{\rm th}$  while the deadline for the second book is March  $9^{\rm th}$ . Keep earning those prizes!



## Eighth Grade News

#### Science Classes

Science classes are continuing to work on their curriculum. Eighth grade is finishing up the Chemistry unit and will begin working on Physics concepts. Seventh grade is completing work on cellular level concepts and will begin working on animal behavior and environmental interactions. With the new Next Generation Science Standards, I am working hard to develop meaningful projects that relate to the new requirements. All seventh and eighth grade classes have conducted and written formal laboratory reports this year. This will help them prepare for the increased science requirements at the high school level.

#### Math

The month of February will bring a lot of excitement to math classes. The eighth grade Algebra class has begun factoring polynomials and working with multi-step geometry questions. Sixth and seventh grade will be mastering geometry, statistics, and probability concepts over the next month. All junior high math classes have been using IXL.com math to reinforce concepts learned in class. Also, classes are spending one class period per week preparing for PARCC testing. Since the test is completed on the computer, we are learning how to input equations, manipulate tools and diagrams, and use the technology to our advantage.

### Valentine's Party

The junior high Valentine's Day party will be Friday, February 12<sup>th</sup>. We will have an early pizza lunch at school and then skate at Skateland in Channahon during the afternoon. Students will return to school before 3 pm. A letter and

permission slip will be sent home approximately a week before the trip. Parents who signed up to provide treats or pop for the party will be receiving a reminder letter in the next week.

#### Student Council

Thank you to all the students and families who brought in hats, gloves, mittens, and scarves for the Mitten Tree collection. Your very generous donations were taken to the Kendall County Food Pantry in Yorkville. We also collected canned goods and paper products for the Kendall County Food Pantry during the last two weeks of January and at LOOP Movie Night. Someone from Newark Health Clinic's office will be here April 8<sup>th</sup> to do sports physicals for next year. Remember if your child plans to play in any sport they must have a current sport physical on file with the school office before beginning practices. The only exception will be for 6<sup>th</sup> grade which must have a complete school physical before practicing.

Just a reminder to parents; this is flu season. Flu-like symptoms include the following:

Fever Cough Sore Throat

Runny Nose Body Aches

Chills

Fatigue Nausea/Vomiting Diarrhea

Also, please remember to help prevent the spread of the flu by doing the following:

• Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after you cough or sneeze. When soap and water are not available, alcohol-based and antibacterial hand cleaners and wipes are also effective.

- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth. Germs spread this way.
- Cover your nose and mouth with tissue when you cough and sneeze. Throw the tissues in the trash after you use it. (or a shirt sleeve or elbow if no tissue is available)

Please watch for any flu-like symptoms in your children and keep them home until they are fever free for at least 24 hours, without the use of fever-reducing medications.


